Mental Health & Wellbeing- Redbridge Mental Health Support Team (Article 24)


At Glade Primary School, there are a number of professionals that we work closely with to support and enhance pupil and parent wellbeing, one of these being The Mental Health Support Team (MHST).

The MHST is part of the Redbridge Well-Being Team (REWT) within the Educational Psychology Service. This service provides a range of brief, evidence based interventions to support children and young people experiencing anxiety, low mood and/or behavioural difficulties. The team is made up of Educational Psychologist (EPs) and Educational Mental Health Practitioners (EMHPs) who work directly with students in Secondary Schools and Parents of Primary age pupils. The MHST also run a range of group wellbeing interventions at our School.



If your child is experiencing low mood, anxiety or behavioural difficulties please raise your concerns with the Class Teacher or email parentsenco@glade.primary.sch.uk so that we are able to support your child and/or family.

Safeguarding- (Article 19)

Fortnite Battle Royale, commonly simply called Fortnite, is a popular video game from Epic Games. It offers a knife-edge gun battle that requires practice, skill, teamwork and fast reactions. The challenge for parents is to limit risks and maximise benefits from Fortnite.

In the UK, the Video Standards council rate Fortnite as PEGI 12 for frequent scenes of mild violence. You know your child best and can use this information to make an informed decision about whether Fortnite is appropriate or your child. However, children under the age of 13 automatically receive a cabined account through the Epic Games Store. You must give parental permission for them to access all in-game features.



Fornite has a variety of parental controls that mirror those offered in the Epic Games Store.

Monitor who they talk to- Along with suitability, it's worth checking the online communication settings on the game to ensure children aren't talking to strangers.

Manage in-app purchases- The game has considerable in-app purchases that you need to be aware of as well, and set up passwords on credit cards associated with the system.

Keep track of screen time- Finally, it's important to have some limits in terms of playtime for the game. This is something you can agree with your child once you understand how the game works.

Ultimately, families will get the most out of the game where parents join in and turn it from something played in bedrooms to a game for the family room that everyone enjoys. 

Important Information from UK Health Security Agency - Measles / MMR vaccination

Measles cases are rising across the country with over 102,000 children starting primary school in England being at risk of catching the disease. We are asking education settings to share key messages from the NHS about MMR/measles and how to get vaccinated.

Measles can be a very serious disease, leading to ear and chest infections, fits, diarrhoea and damage to the brain. Measles can kill. It is also dangerous to pregnant women, babies and those that are clinically vulnerable. Your child is at risk of measles if he or she has not had two doses of MMR, measles, mumps and rubella Vaccination.

If your child has not had two doses of this vaccine, no matter what age they are, you should contact your GP so that they can have their vaccination as soon as possible. If you are unsure, then please speak to your GP




Attendance (Article 28)

Children are required to attend school for 190 days each year. The Government's target for attendance for Primary School Pupils is at least 95%.

How does your child's attendance compare with this target?

This diagram indicates how just a few days absence can result in children missing a significant number of lessons. It is proved that children who miss a lot of school achieve less.

Penalty Notice Fines for School Attendance are Changing!

With the introduction of the new National Framework for Penalty Notices, the following changes will come into force for Penalty Notice Fines issued after 19th August 2024.

- Per Parent, Per Child Penalty Notice Fines will now be issued to each parent, for each child that was absent.
- 5 consecutive days of term time leave- Penalty Notice Fines will be issued for term time leave of 5 or more consecutive days.
- First Offence -The first time a Penalty Notice is issued for Term Time Leave or Irregular Attendance the amount will be: £160 per parent, per child paid within 28 days. Reduced to £80 per parent, per child if paid within 21 days.
- Second Offence (within 3 years)- The second time a Penalty Notice is issued for Term Time Leave or Irregular Attendance the amount will be: £160 per parent, per child paid within 28 days.
- Third Offence and Any Further Offences (within 3 years) -The third time an offence is committed for Term Time Leave or Irregular Attendance a Penalty Notice will not be issued, and the case will be presented straight to the Magistrates' Court. Magistrates' fines can be up to £2500 per parent, per child.
- Cases found guilty in Magistrates' Court can show on the parent's future DBS certificate, due to 'failure to safeguard a child's education'.

Deaf Awareness

This week, the children took part in an interactive assembly delivered by Specialist Education and Training Support Service (SEaTSS). The focus of the assembly was on Deaf Awareness. The pupils learnt what it meant if someone was deaf and how to communicate with them effectively. They also had the opportunity to learn a few signs in British Sign Language.
